### BOND RESOLUTION#38-2022 AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE OF A NEW EXCAVATOR

WHEREAS, this Town Board recognizes the Highway Department's need for a new excavator and has worked with the Highway Superintendent towards the purchase of a new excavator, specifically a Caterpiller M318 Excavator plus three (3) attachments, as detailed on the attached Sales Invoice (the "Purchase"); and

WHEREAS, the Town has complied with all advertising and public bidding requirements necessitated by New York State law for this Purchase; and

WHEREAS, the Town has received a bid of \$328,954.27 for the Purchase from Milton CAT, from Boston, Massachusetts, who the Town Board has found to be the lowest responsible bidder; and

**WHEREAS,** this Board now desires to provide for the issuance of up to \$328,954.27 in serial bonds to pay for the cost of the Purchase; and

**WHEREAS**, this Board deems it to be in the best interest of the citizens of the Town of Hopewell to provide for the financing of the cost of the Purchase.

### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN OF HOPEWELL, ONTARIO COUNTY, NEW YORK, as follows:

- 1. For the object or purpose of paying for the full costs associated with the Purchase, THREE HUNDRED TWENTY-EIGHT THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED FIFTY-FOUR AND 27/100 DOLLARS (\$328,954.27) of General Obligation Serial Bonds of the Town of Hopewell shall be issued pursuant to the provisions of New York State Local Finance Law; and
- 2. The specific object or purpose for which the obligations authorized by this resolution are to be issued is to pay the costs associated with the Purchase; and
  - 3. The estimated maximum cost of such object or purpose is \$328,954.27; and
- 4. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid object or purpose is 15 years, pursuant to subdivision 28 of paragraph a. of section 11.00 of Local Finance Law. It is further determined that the maximum maturity of the Serial Bonds herein authorized will not exceed five years; and
- 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Hopewell, Ontario County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall be annually levied upon all of the taxable real property in the Town a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable; and
- 6. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the Serial Bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the Chief Fiscal Officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents and shall be sold in such manner as may be

prescribed by the Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law; and

- 7. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

## AGREEMENT FOR THE EXPENDITURE OF HIGHWAY MONIES Section 284 of the Highway Law

Bookon 20. 01 in and
AGREEMENT between the Town Superintendent of Highways of the Town of Jope well, of Ontario County, State of New York and the undersigned members of the Town Board.
For the fiscal year of 2023 it is expected that the Town will receive approximately \$ 94,000 in State Aid through the Consolidated Highway Improvement Program (CHIPS) and any other State Aid program.
For the fiscal year of 2025 it is expected that the Highway Accounts will receive approximately \$ 1.6.72,788 from taxes levied within the Town, approximately \$ 105,600 in revenues form equipment rentals, reimbursement for snow and ice removal and other charges for services and as reimbursements from other municipal accounts for services performed with Highway Department personnel and equipment.
For the fiscal year of <u>2027</u> , the Town Board agrees to reappropriate the monies that remain unencumbered from the last fiscal year to the Highway Accounts for this fiscal year.
<b>Pursuant</b> to the provisions of Section 284 of the Highway Law, we agree that moneys levied and collected in the Town for the repair and improvement of highways, the revenues from equipment rentals, reimbursement for snow and ice removal and other charges for services, the reappropriated funds, and the CHIPS and other State Aid for highways, shall be expended as follows:
1A. GENERAL MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS — The sum of \$ 247,276 shall be set aside to be expended for basic work and general maintenance and repairs upon 38.68 miles of Town highways, including surface treatments, sluices, drainage ditches, culverts and bridges, highway, tree and brush removal, board walks, sidewalks that are the responsibility of the Town, emergency activities as such are authorized by the Town Board, and other activities involved with the care, upkeep and maintenance of highways and bridges of the Town.
